Yolo Budget

art five percent increase can apply to them.

The five road districts last year spent \$109,997.91 and this year budgeted \$172,639. However, included in this year's figure is a total balance of \$52,952, which was actually spent last year, but was not paid until this fiscal year because bills for oiling roads in July were not received until July. In addition, there has been legislation apportioning more state funds to the road districts, with the result that these increases are of necessity included in the new budgets, which merely estimate the amount of money available during the coming year and not the amount actually to be expended.

It is the belief of Yolo officials that the exemptions claimed by this county will be allowed, but if they should be ruled invalid, it would develop that the Yolo county budget is in excess of the five percent increase allowed.

Stanislaus Case

The Stanislaus county case is the first test case in the state.

Represented by Assemblyman E. H. Zion of Modesto, the petitioning group contended that Stanislaus county supervisors exceeded the five percent increase limitation fixed by the Riley-Stewart plan. The excess amounted to \$130,000, or 20 per cent, it was argued.

Verdict in the appeal was expected to settle legality of Attorney General Webb's ruling that, in computing the five percent permissive budget increase, supervisors should exclude school costs, now paid by the state, from the base.

Twenty counties which are reported to have exceeded the Riley-Stewart plan limitation will be affected by the decision in the Stanislaus case. The appellate court took the case under advisement.

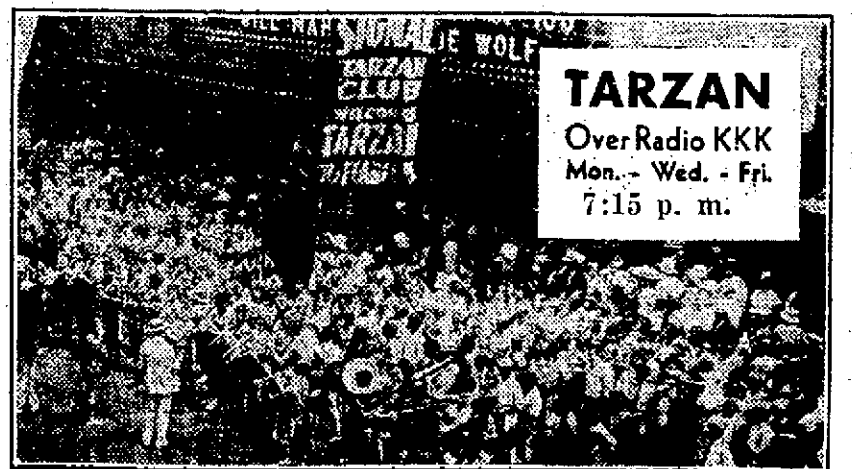
Judge's Sister Explains Kidnaping
